



Religious Education: Unit Overview- Humanism

Humanism Overview

What knowledge must the children acquire by the end of Year 6?

- Know that humanism is a positive philosophy which believes in living good and happy lives without the need for a god or gods
- Know that humanists believe that human beings are unique
- Know that humanists believe that our ability to question, reason, empathise and be creative is what makes us special and what we should value
- Know that humanists believe that how human beings have evolved and improved is what makes us special
- Know that humanists reject sacred texts and divine authority (deities)
- Know that humanists believe that science is the best way to understand the universe
- Know that humanists believe that all life on earth evolved from a common ancestor (evolution)
- Know that humanists are willing to change their beliefs if new evidence is found
- Know that humanists can be atheist or agnostic; they believe there is a lack of convincing evidence for a god or gods
- Know that atheists do not believe in a god or gods
- Know that agnostics believe you can't know whether god or gods exists or not
- Know that humanists believe that happiness is a worthwhile goal
- Know that 'The Happy Human' is a symbol of humanism.
- Know that humanists believe there are lots of ways of finding happiness and that we must respect different people's ways as long as they do not cause harm to others
- Know that humanists do not believe in an afterlife – 'the time to be happy is now'
- Know that humanists believe that human beings are responsible for their own destiny.
- Know that humanists believe that the natural world and the environment in which we live should be valued
- Know that humanists believe that relationships and companionship should be valued
- Know that humanists believe in the following moral values: kindness, compassion, fairness, justice and honesty.
- Know that humanists believe in The Golden Rule which means treating others in the way you want to be treated
- Know that humanists believe humans should be good to one another to promote happiness and avoid doing harm
- Know that humanists believe in accepting individual responsibility for our actions
- Know that humanists value and celebrate human life by marking key moments – birth, weddings, death
- Know that humanist naming ceremonies celebrate the arrival of a new baby and promise love and promise support from family and friends
- Know that humanist weddings celebrate the importance of human relationships and the need for love and support from other people
- Know that there is no special humanist festival but many humanists celebrate traditional festivals such as Christmas as a time to recognise the importance of

family, friendship and kindness.

Year 6

End of Unit Outcome:

To have an understanding of the Humanist faith and be able to make comparisons with the other faiths studied.

Opportunities for writing, oracy and mathematics:

Write an explanation of how a person's belief in afterlife may affect how they live their lives.
